### Jamaica Welcomes Nigerian Nurse Educators



Jamaica's health sector has received a vital boost with the arrival of four volunteer nurses from Nigeria, who will serve for two years under the Nigerian Technical Aid Corps programme. Their expertise comes at a critical time, as the country works to ease severe shortages of specialist nurses.

The initiative supports the World Health Organisation's call for equitable access to health workers and innovative approaches to sharing workforce capacities.

"We face an unprecedented demand for qualified. compassionate health professionals. The global health workforce crisis, particularly the shortage of skilled nurses - is one of the most pressing challenges of our time," said Dr. the Hon. Christopher Tufton, Minister of Health & Wellness. "But today we are demonstrating what is possible when countries move beyond competition and towards collaboration."

Two of the nurses are. PhD-qualified educators in Community Health and Mental Health Nursing who will support training programmes at the University of Technology and the In-Service Training and Education Unit, with the latter expected to train more than 200 nurses annually.

The other two volunteers – both Registered Nurses and Midwives – will serve under the South East Regional Health Authority, mentoring specialist nurses in training.

Jamaica continues to face a shortage of specialist nurses across several areas, including midwifery, psychiatry, critical care, oncology and paediatrics. The Ministry is advancing its Nursing and Midwifery Human Resources Plan, and the Minister has encouraged Registered Nurses to pursue specialist training, reminding of available support such as the Dr. Barry Wint Scholarship.
