

Nearly 200 Jamaicans Awarded Dr. Barry Wint Memorial Scholarship



The Ministry of Health & Wellness continues to invest in building a stronger health workforce, as part of its commitment to transforming Jamaica's healthcare system.

From strengthening primary healthcare to addressing shortages in specialist services, the Ministry's focus remains on ensuring that people are at the centre of health delivery.

As part of this effort, nearly 200 Jamaicans have been awarded the Dr. Barry Wint Memorial Scholarship for 2025. Valued at over J\$281 million, the awards support studies in critical areas such as biomedical engineering, radiology, counselling therapy, medical physics, dental nurse therapy, and advanced nursing and medical education.

The scholarship, established in honour of former Chief Medical Officer Dr. Barry Wint, is designed to help train and retain skilled professionals within Jamaica's health system.

Since its introduction, 38 graduates from the first cohort of 536 recipients have already joined the public health workforce.

Minister of Health & Wellness, Dr. the Hon. Christopher Tufton CD, MP, commended the recipients, noting that the programme represents a timely investment: "The need for a robust, compassionate and well-trained healthcare workforce has never been greater. We stand at a critical moment where the health workforce across the globe, including here in Jamaica, faces extraordinary challenges especially due to mass migration among staff."

Looking ahead, the programme is expected to steadily increase the number of trained professionals across multiple disciplines, adding hundreds of doctors, nurses, dentists, midwives, and social workers to Jamaica's healthcare system by 2029.

Celebrating Leadership in Public Health

The Ministry of Health & Wellness joins the nation in celebrating two of our own, who have been recognised among Jamaica's 2025 National Honours and Awards recipients.

Dr. the Hon. Christopher Tufton, MP, Minister of Health & Wellness, and Dr. Karen Webster-Kerr, Principal Medical Officer & National Epidemiologist have each been conferred the Order of Distinction in the rank of Commander (CD) for their outstanding service to public health.

The honour is not only theirs, it is a reflection of what Jamaica can achieve when vision and expertise meet national purpose.

For nearly a decade, Dr. Tufton has steered the Ministry with a steady hand, pressing forward reforms to strengthen primary care, improve health infrastructure, and expand access to services that touch every community. His leadership has reminded us that health is not only about treating illness but about creating environments where people can live well.




Dr. Webster-Kerr has been one of the Ministry's quiet but commanding forces. From guiding Jamaica back to malaria elimination to shaping data-driven responses during the COVID-19 pandemic, her work has safeguarded lives and strengthened our national capacity to respond to public health threats. WHICH HIGH SCHOOL DID YOU ATTEND: Jonathan Grant High School.


FAVOURITE CHILDHOOD MEMORY: My favourite childhood memory would be family gatherings filled with laughter, food, music and games that would go late into the night.
